Who Wants to Be Cat Food?

Everyone seems to agree that the Eagles v Pies game is the one more likely to produce a memorable finish this weekend. Chi and BKB are both tipping narrow victories to the Pies and Quila's predicting an Eagles upset win, but by less than a goal.

Not that the Hawks v Roos game is without merit. But, you do have to wonder about the Roos' ability to rebound from such a devastating loss at the hands of the Cats just one week ago.

By the way, whilst the Roos are notionally at home this weekend, for wagering purposes I have the Hawks down as playing at home. When you consider that, prior to the finals, the Hawks had played at the MCG on 8 occasions, whilst the Roos had played there only 3 times, I think you'll agree that the Hawks have ground-familiarity on their side.

 One bet on 1 team in 1 game with around 5% of (Notional Initial) Line Funds at risk. Hardly worth the effort really.

Zzzzzz

Unless you're a Strategy D Investor, there's not much wagering interest for you this weekend as we've only a single Line Bet to fret over, and it's on the Eagles with $6\frac{1}{2}$ start against the Pies.

You'll understand why I'm a bit apprehensive about any Line bet where we're getting 6½ points start when you see the following table, which summarises the performance of our Line bets this year depending on the points start we received.

Absent that shocking first row we'd now be 19 and 12 for the season on Line betting and showing a much healthier profit (notwithstanding that a number of our wagers on teams with $6\frac{1}{2}$ start have been of a size below the standard 7.78% of NIF). Next year I reckon the Line Fund will ignore any market where the start's less than 8 points.

It turns out that, generally this season, teams with small starts have fared well head-to-head and on Line betting, as the following table depicts:

So, teams receiving $6\frac{1}{2}$ points start or less won outright 63% of the time and covered the spread 59% of the time. In contrast, teams receiving $7\frac{1}{2}$ to $23\frac{1}{2}$ points start won outright only about 60% of the time and covered the spread just 45% of the time. Only the marked success of teams receiving $24\frac{1}{2}$ or more points start has dragged the overall rate of Line betting victories for teams giving start back up to around the optimal value of 50%.

One aspect of this table that intrigues me is the split, for games won by the team giving start, between:

- winning and covering the spread (91 games), and
- winning but failing to cover the spread (27 games)

Eagles to win (with start) (Given the simplicity of these weekend's wagering, I feel justified in leaving the creation of the Ready Reckoner as an exercise for Investors with just a little time on their hands.)

- Hawthorn and the Roos are 1-1 for the season; in the more recent clash the Roos won by 37 points in Round 17 at Aurora Stadium


Frankly, a bit like an outback dunny: not a lot to go on there.

Turning instead to the history of the current Finals system, as I mentioned in the previous newsletter, on the only previous occasion where 4^{th} met 5^{th} , 4^{th} was the victor. The matchup of 3^{rd} vs 6^{th} has been a little more common: in the three previous encounters under the current finals system 3^{rd} place leads 2-1.

The Finals System

Here's a reminder of what lies ahead for the six remaining teams (the picture is courtesy of Wikipedia).



The winner of the Roos v Hawthorn game gets to play Port Adelaide at Footy Park on Saturday the 22nd of September at 4pm (local time), and the winner of the Collingwood v Weagles clash faces Geelong at the MCG (yes, I know it's supposed to be a home game for the Cats - but, you know, contractual arrangements and all ...) on Friday the 21st of September at 7:50pm. I feel a Heritage bet coming on, probably a large one.

Update on TAB Sportsbet Prices


Geelong are now at \$1.55 for the Flag which means that, assuming the bookie's vig to be levied equally on all the teams, Geelong are considered roughly a 55% chance to win the Big One. Port Adelaide has now grabbed outright second favoritism at \$4.40, with West Coast lengthening and Collingwood shortening to join one another on the 3rd line of betting at \$10. Thereafter follows the Hawks and the largely written-off Roos.


It's interesting to look back at how the teams' implicit probability of winning the Flag based on Sportsbet's pricing has varied across the season.

Firstly, here's the chart for teams 1st to 4th:




As I've noted before, the Roos just haven't been rated by the bookies all year, and it's taken some recent form to have them take any real notice of Port Adelaide. Geelong generally bobbled around the 10% mark until late May, then lifted to about a 25% chance until late July after which they've surged to attain their current 55% rating.

Next, here's the chart for teams 5th to 8th (note the different scale on the y-axis):




There's quite some volatility there, with the Swans being rated a 14% chance as recently as a couple of weeks back. Note just how unfancied the Hawks and the Pies were in early-season markets. Even in late May the Hawks were considered only a 2% chance.

Here's the next chart. It's for teams 9th to 12th:



Oh what lofty hopes there were for Freo and the Saints in the pre- and early-season markets. And to think that Essendon were considered a 6% chance as late as mid June, as were Brisbane in late July and the Saints in early August.

Finally, here's the chart for teams 13th to 16th:



Some reasonable hopes there for the Bulldogs until quite late in the season, and some early-season interest in the Dees, but not a lot there for the Blues or the Tigers, who both struggled to crack the 2% line all season.

The GF Quinella market still has the 1^{st} v 2^{nd} matchup of Geelong v Port as the most likely, but now has the 1^{st} v 5^{th} matchup of Geelong v Hawthorn on the second line. Next is Port Adelaide (2^{nd}) v Collingwood (6^{th}), closely followed by Port Adelaide (2^{nd}) v West Coast (3^{rd}) and Geelong (1^{st}) v Roos (4^{th}).

Appendix

Notional Initial Funds

For reasons that are somewhat technical (I'm happy to provide details to anyone who's interested but, broadly, it allows me to describe bets in terms of a common percentage for all Investors and still maintain the same share price for all Investors), I need to calculate what I call "Notional Initial Funds". It's calculated separately for each Fund.

For original Investors, the definition is straightforward:

Notional Initial Funds = Actual Funds Invested

For Investors who join the Fund post Round 1:

Notional Initial Funds = Actual Funds Invested / Share Price at the time of investing (in other words, it's the notional amount that would need to have been invested at the start of the season in order to have returned an amount equal to the amount actually invested).
